The stunning new novel from prizewinner Jojo Moyes, about houses and homes, grief and love, and what's really important in life.

Born into a symphony of bird song on Greenfields farm, Dancer loves to move her hooves to nature's beat. She finds pure joy in her horsey ballet with her best colt friend, Jetson. Every day is spent blissfully trotting out prancing rhythms and trying to best each other's moves. Then the day comes when the pair are sold to the Albritton stable to learn dressage. Their new owner is cold and calculating with no real love for horses beyond their monetary value. Dancer is faced with a cruel owner and the disdain of the big jumpers in the pastures. Can Dancer cope with her new life? When the owner threatens to sell Jetson and separate the two forever, Dancer must find a way for them to stay together. A young girl named Ann enters Dancer's world seeking solace from some bullies of her own. Can Dancer help the girl find her key to happiness? Will Ann and Dancer become best friends? Dancer wonders if a horse can even truly love a human. When the owner goes too far and hurts Dancer, Jetson decides to fight back. Will Dancer and Jetson even be allowed to stay together? How will Dancer cope with the big bullying jumpers in the herd? Dancer tells of her journey to understand the meaning of the word love in both the horse and the human world. Hilary James ('Mousie') is sixteen when she wins The Fuller Trophy jumping with her horse Dancer at the Royal Winter Fair. Her triumph is rewarded with an invitation to perform in England for Queen Elizabeth, but she has also attracted the unwanted attention of the evil Samuel Owens who plots to acquire Dancer for his niece, Sara. Thwarted in his initial attempt to purchase the horse, Owens has his hired man, Chad Smith, try to steal it. Mousie has a dream in which a beautiful blond horsewoman warns her of impending danger. She wakes to discover Chad Smith, syringe in hand, in Dancer's stall. Chad Smith is killed in the ensuing scuffle and his employer comes under suspicion. Dancer is flown to Highgrove, the country home of Prince Charles, and Mousie arrives with her mother Christine at 'Clusters' -- an English manor, once the home of Arabella, the second wife of the Duke of Dewbury, now both long dead. Mousie finds an antique lady's hunting whip which she feels certain must have belonged to Arabella, and later discovers a portrait of her riding side-saddle. It is the same woman who appeared in Mousie's dreams.

David Lewis's untimely death on 14 October 2001 deprived the philosophical community of one of the outstanding philosophers of the 20th century. As many obituaries remarked, Lewis has an undeniable place in the history of analytical philosophy. His work defines much of the current agenda in metaphysics, philosophical logic, and the philosophy of mind and language. This volume, an expanded edition of a special issue of the Australasian Journal of Philosophy, covers many of the topics for which Lewis was well known, including possible worlds, counterpart theory, vagueness, knowledge, probability, essence, fiction, laws, conditionals, desire and belief, and truth. Many of the papers are by very established philosophers; others are by younger scholars including many he taught. The volume also includes Lewis's Jack Smart Lecture at the Australian National University, How Many Lives has Schrödinger's Cat?, published here for the first time. Lewisian Themes will be an invaluable resource for anyone studying Lewis's work and a major contribution to the many topics that he mastered.
